Voluntary Assisted Dying Implementation in SA

Background

- Legislation passed 24 June 2021
- Implementation date: Originally March 2023, but State Government has brought forward to January 31st 2023 & will continue to assess if earlier date is possible
- Implementation Taskforce commenced December 2021
- Taskforce & Working Groups representatives cover clinical, consumer, pharmacy, education & training & legal/ethical aspects.
- SA government committed to support introduction of accessible and equitable pathway that gives South Australians with terminal illness choice at end of life & ensures integrity of safeguards in Act.



Guiding principles

- (1) A person exercising a power or performing a function or duty under this Act must have regard to the following principles:
 - (a) every human life has equal value;
 - (b) a person's autonomy should be respected;
 - > (c) a person has the right to be supported in making informed decisions about the person's medical treatment, and should be given, in a manner the person understands, information about medical treatment options including comfort and palliative care;
 - > (d) every person approaching the end of life should be provided with quality care to minimise the person's suffering and maximise the person's quality of life;
 - > (e) a therapeutic relationship between a person and the person's health practitioner should, wherever possible, be supported and maintained;
 - > (f) individuals should be encouraged to openly discuss death and dying and an individual's preferences and values should be encouraged and promoted;
 - > (g) individuals should be supported in conversations with the individual's health practitioners, family and carers and community about treatment and care preferences;
 - (h) individuals are entitled to genuine choices regarding their treatment and care;
 - > (i) there is a need to protect individuals who may be subject to abuse;
 - > (j) all persons, including health practitioners, have the right to be shown respect for their culture, beliefs, values and personal characteristics;
 - > (k) every person has the right to make decisions about medical treatment options freely and not as a consequence of the suggestion, pressure, coercion or undue influence of others.

Criteria for access Voluntary Assisted Dying

- > To access voluntary assisted dying, a person must meet **all** of the following eligibility criteria:
 - 1. aged 18+
 - 2. Australian citizen or permanent resident; <u>and</u> be ordinarily resident in SA for at least 12 months
 - 3. have decision-making capacity in relation to voluntary assisted dying
 - 4. be diagnosed with disease, illness or medical condition that:
 - is incurable; and
 - is advanced, progressive and will cause death; and
 - is expected to cause death within weeks or months, not exceeding 6 months (12 months for people with a neurodegenerative condition); and
 - is causing suffering that cannot be relieved in a manner the person considers tolerable.



Medical Practitioners

- > The Act only allows medical practitioners to provide voluntary assisted dying
 - 27—Minimum requirements for coordinating medical practitioners and consulting medical practitioners
 - (1) Each coordinating medical practitioner and consulting medical practitioner must—
 - (a) hold a fellowship with a specialist medical college; or
 - (b) be a vocationally registered general practitioner.
 - (2) Either the coordinating medical practitioner or each consulting medical practitioner must have practised as a registered medical practitioner for at least 5 years after completing a fellowship with a specialist medical college or vocational registration (as the case requires).
 - (3) Either the coordinating medical practitioner or each consulting medical practitioner must have relevant expertise and experience in the disease, illness or medical condition expected to cause the death of the person being assessed.
- > Both medical practitioners must complete compulsory voluntary assisted dying training before conducting an assessment
- Medical practitioners are prohibited from initiating a discussion about voluntary assisted dying. However, they may provide information about VAD if a person requests it.



Conscientious Objectors

- > There are different rights imposed by the Act with respect to conscientious objectors:
 - > Registered health practitioners have right to refuse to be involved in all aspects
 - Health Services Establishments must ensure that patients advised of service's refusal to participate in voluntary assisted dying. However, they must have arrangements in place to transfer person to other facilities so they can access voluntary assisted dying; & take reasonable steps to facilitate such transfer.
 - > **Residential Facilities** must not hinder person's access at facility to information about voluntary assisted dying. Must, on request, allow reasonable access to person by a health practitioner or other lawfully participating individual to enable requests, assessments, declarations permits & administration



Voluntary Assisted Dying Pathway



1 Make a first request for voluntary assisted dying



Doctor completes a first assessment



A consulting doctor completes a second assessment



Complete a written declaration to access voluntary assisted dying



Make a final request for voluntary assisted dying



Choose a contact person



Doctor completes a final review



Doctor prescribes substance once permit approved



Arrange supply of substance with pharmacist



Decide to administer substance

Characteristics of medication: self-administered instructions on how to self-advantate the medication pre-medication suspension and sweet synup liquid for mixing voluntary asserted dying medication measuring tools, and contact information of the coordinating medical practitioner and the statewide pharmacs



Characteristics of medication: practitioner administered

Support and Governance

- Voluntary Assisted Dying Review Board
- VAD Care Navigator Service.
- Provides support system for anyone seeking information or access to VAD service
- Linkage role between local support services & resources
- Manages regional access support scheme for those living in regional SA where no local VAD trained practitioner
- Care provided wherever it is needed, face to face, telephone, email, video-conference (in line with Commonwealth carriage service considerations)
- VAD Pharmacy Service.
- Provides education & support regarding self administration for person
- Provides education & support to medical practitioners providing physician administered VAD
- Work closely with Care Navigator Service
- VAD Liaison Roles.
- One in each metro LHN & one combined regional role
- Support patients & clinicians

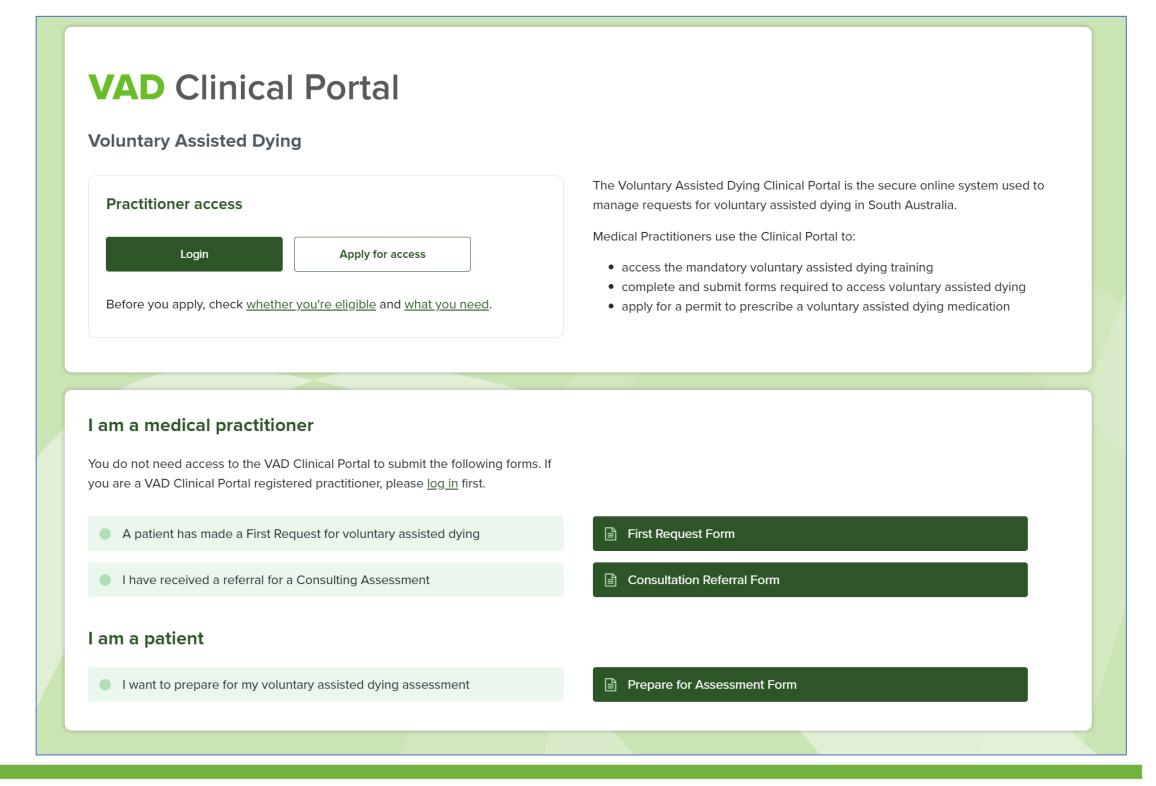

Practitioner participation

On 16 March 2022, SA Health opened a survey to understand the capacity & willingness of SA health & medical practitioners to participate in Voluntary Assisted Dying Pathway

The survey has received responses from:

- > 590+ health practitioners
- > 160+ medical practitioners
- > represents over 1% of all health and medical practitioners in South Australia

40+ medical practitioners have identified they are eligible & willing to act as coordinating medical practitioner
